

GENERAL DISCIPLINE

To ensure an environment that supports academic rigor and proper behavior, the following quidelines have been issued:

1. General Conduct

- Students must maintain discipline and decorum on campus.
- ▶ Maintain the protocol to be followed in classrooms.
- ▶ Students are strictly prohibited from indulging in anti-national, anti-social, communal and political activities in the campus. Respect for faculty, staff and fellow students is mandatory.
- ▶ The campus should foster healthy, inclusive relationships that promote harmony and mutual respect, without any sense of exclusivity. Any activities that negatively impacts a student's academic performance or is deemed inappropriate and damaging to the reputation of the college will be brought to the attention of the person responsible.
- ▶ Any form of discrimination, harassment, or misconduct will result in disciplinary action as per UGC and University of Calicut guidelines.
- ▶ The use of cell phones/mobile phones is strictly prohibited within the college campus.
- ▶ Students who are permitted to use phones outside the campus for safety reasons must obtain prior approval and store their devices in the designated area in switch off mode. Any violation of these rules will result in disciplinary action, including the confiscation of the device.
- Conserve electricity and water by using facilities only when necessary.
- ▶ Maintain a clean and tidy campus at all times. Dispose of waste responsibly and refrain from littering. Support the efforts of the housekeeping staff by keeping the toilets clean and hygienic.
- ▶ Hostel inmates should follow the instructions of the warden.

2. Attendance and Academics

The day begins with a first bell at 9.25 am followed by morning prayer at

9:30 a.m. The first hour starts immediately after the prayer and ends at 10:25 a.m. The second hour runs from 10:30 a.m. to 11:15 a.m., followed by a 15-minute break. The third hour begins at 11:30 a.m. and concludes at 12:30 p.m., after which the lunch break takes place from 12:30 p.m. to 1:25 p.m. Attendance is recorded after lunch break. The fourth hour ends at 2:25 p.m., the final class session concludes at 3:25 p.m.

- ▶ On Fridays the lunch break will end at 2p.m and the fourth hour ends at 2.40p.m.
- ▶ To be eligible for semester examinations, students must maintain a minimum of 75% attendance, as per the regulations of the University of Calicut.
- ▶ Students who are not present in the classroom at 9:30 a.m. or 1:25 p.m. during attendance marking will be considered absent for half a day. Likewise, any absence during any period of the day will also result in a half-day attendance loss.
- ▶ Active participation in all lectures, practical sessions, and academic activities is mandatory.
- ▶ Students are required to submit assignments and projects within the prescribed deadlines.
- ▶ Students are required to remit their university semester fee within one month of the commencement of each semester, a late fee of Rs 100 per month will be charged for delayed payments.

2.1 Examination

- ▶ All students are required to attend two internal exams per semester.
- Students must wear their uniforms, carry their ID cards and hall tickets and arrive punctually at the exam hall.
- ▶ Any form of academic misconduct, including malpractice in exams, plagiarism, or dishonesty, will result in serious consequences.

2.2 Industrial Visit

- ▶ Study tours (Industrial Visit) and batch picnics are organized as part of the academic curriculum and are therefore considered mandatory for all students. In case of a serious or unavoidable reason, prior exemption must be sought and obtained from the Principal.
- ▶ The application and detailed schedule of the tour, recommended by both the class teacher and the faculty in-charge, must be submitted to the Principal well in advance for approval.
- ▶ It is mandatory that at least one male and one female faculty member accompany the students during the tour.
- ▶ Only tour operators approved by the government are permitted to conduct tours for students.

3. Dress Code

- Students are expected to dress modestly and appropriately while on campus.
- ▶ Students must wear the prescribed uniform on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. On Wednesdays, a formal dress code must be maintained. Low-waist pants, Tshirts, leggings and fancy attire are strictly prohibited.
- ▶ Pregnant students are required to wear an appropriate dress of the same color as their uniform.
- ▶ Students must wear their identity cards around their neck at all times while on campus during the academic schedule. Attendance for subjects will not be granted to those who fail to wear their identity cards.
- ▶ Students should carry their identity cards when they represent the college for any function outside.
- ▶ Students must promptly report the loss of their identity card to the college office.
- ▶ A replacement card will be issued at a cost determined by the Principal.
- ▶ The identity card is mandatory for entry into the library and labs.
- ▶ Upon course completion, students must surrender their identity card to obtain their Transfer Certificate.

4. Campus Discipline

- ▶ Ragging is strictly prohibited by law as per UGC's Anti-Ragging Policy and is considered as a non-bailable offence, punishable with rigorous imprisonment for up to 7 years.
- ▶ Complaints or information related to ragging may be made orally, in writing or even through third parties. Such complaints can be reported to the Principal, any member of the Anti-Ragging Cell or any faculties.
- ▶ The use of narcotic drugs, tobacco, alcohol, and similar substances is strictly prohibited on campus. Strict disciplinary action will be taken against anyone found in violation.
- Any form of violence, vandalism or disruption of college activities is not tolerated.
- ▶ We maintain a neutral stance toward all political organizations and ideologies. Students are strictly prohibited from organizing, attending or participating in any activities or protests affiliated with student organizations of political parties.
- ▶ Students must carry their identity cards at all times and present them when required.

- ▶ Unauthorized gatherings, protests or distribution of pamphlets require prior permission from the administration.
- ▶ Maintain the etiquette required of campus life avoiding vulgar and profane language.
- ▶ No student shall enter into any contract in the name of the college except with prior written authorization from college officials vested with the authority to sign a contract on behalf of the college.
- ▶ Students are not allowed to enter Faculty Rooms and the College Office without permission.
- ▶ No student can leave the campus during academic hours without the written permission of the Principal.

5. Library and Laboratory Rules

- Students must scan their ID cards when entering and exiting the library and labs.
- ▶ E-library access is available on a first-come, first-served basis.
- ▶ Silence must be maintained in the library and study areas.
- ▶ Books and resources should be handled with care and returned on time.
- ▶ Students are required to keep their belongings outside the library.

FYUGP REGULATIONS

Three Types of UG Programs

1. Three-Year UG Programme

The undergraduate program spans three years, requiring a minimum of 133 credits and a maximum of 180 credits, after which students can pursue a two-year postgraduate program.

2. Four-Year UG Programme: UG Honours

The four-year undergraduate honors program requires a minimum of 177 credits and a maximum of 240 credits, followed by a one-year postgraduate program, with the fourth year consisting of 11 courses or 9 courses plus an optional 8-credit project.

3. Four-Year UG Programme: UG Honours with Research

The four-year undergraduate honors program with research requires a minimum of 177 credits and a maximum of 240 credits, featuring a mandatory 12-credit research project in the fourth year, and offers students the option to pursue either a one-year postgraduate program or directly enroll in a PhD program.

Three Year Degree Programme Specific Components

To fulfill the major requirement, a student needs to complete 50% of the total credits in a single discipline, which translates to 68 credits (50% of 133) and 17 courses in a three-year undergraduate program.

A minor requires completing 24 credits (6 courses) in a discipline other than the major, which can be related or unrelated to the major, in a three-year undergraduate programme.
